

# We sat on a mat and had a chat and made maps! #MagicCarpet

#### Part of Unlimited $\rightarrow$

Look at and touch a tapestry art called 'I Run and Run, Let Out an Earth Shattering Roar, and Turn into a Giant Octopussy', part of research project We Sat on a Mat and Had a Chat and Made Maps! #MagicCarpet.

Does your mind wander? Where does it go? What do you see? How far is too far? What does mind wandering enable you to do? When does it become disabling?

Perched on an invisible loom, the tapestry is one of the various outcomes of the research project by artist Dr Kai Syng Tan in collaboration with Philip Asherson, Professor of Molecular Psychiatry at King's College London. The project draws on emerging research on the universality of mind wandering as well as how it relates to visual art and attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD).

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At the artist's talk, Kai Syng Tan gives a performance-lecture titled 'I Run and Run, Let Out an Earth Shattering Roar, and Turn into a Giant Octopussy and Other Tales of Unreasonable Adjustments'. This is followed by a conversation with collaborator Professor Philip Asherson and a Q&A.

Throw academic treatise, auto-ethnography, cine-essay, stand-up comedy and impressive lumps of salt and MSG together, and you get artist-academic Dr Kai Syng Tan's unique performance-lecture, a format that she has cultivated over the years and which has been enjoyed all over the world.

Topics she may touch on include: hyperactivity, risk-taking and impulsively of Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) and how they relate to creativity; the boundaries between 'normality' and 'abnormality', the triple invisibility of neuro-diverse BAME women and how this is a hidden problem/resource; horniness and taking life by its horns; dating in the age of Tinder; and her own dream app, Hinder, which connects artists with members of other species to facilitate creative collisions and 'productive antagonisms'

The performance-lecture is a provocation to widen the discourse on neuro-diversity and how the arts can complicate the discourse, not only rerouting audiences' expectations by pulling the carpet from under their feet but also sweeping them off their feet.
