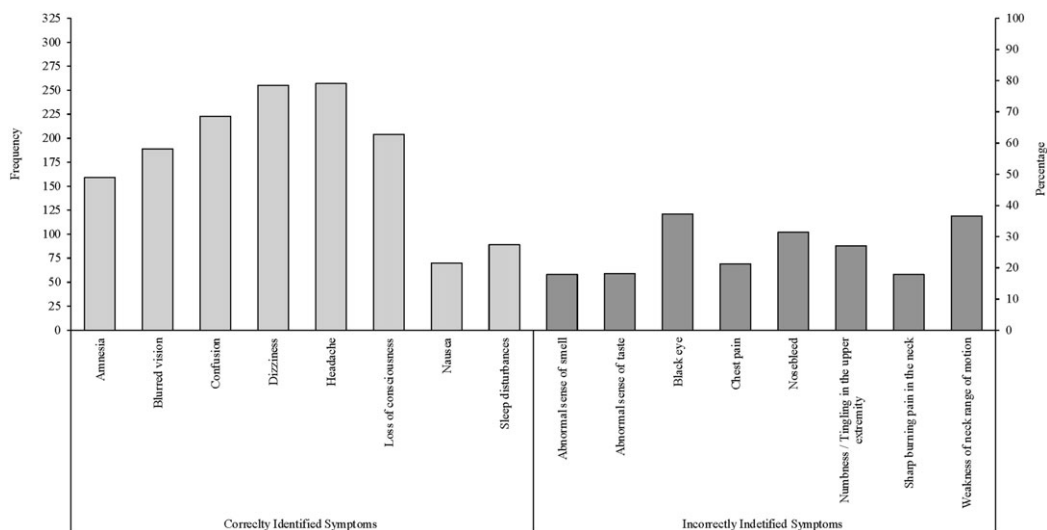


Figure 2. Frequency and percentage of responses identified correct and incorrect SRC symptoms.
